What is ARVL?

RSL Care SA's Andrew Russell Veteran Living (ARVL) is a veteran's housing program which aims to ensure that ex-service personnel in South Australia have the opportunity to access appropriate and affordable housing solutions.

ARVL provides housing options for veterans in two ways:


Through an emergency accommodation program designed for those that are homeless or at risk of homelessness

An affordable housing portfolio designed to provide long term affordable housing solutions.

Who was Andrew Russell?

SGT Andrew Russell was a South Australian born SAS soldier who was killed in Afghanistan in February 2002 when the long-range patrol vehicle he was travelling in struck a suspected anti-vehicle mine. Andrew was the first Australian military death in action since the Vietnam War more than 30 years earlier.

SGT Russell enlisted into the Australian Regular Army on the 26th of November 1986. After he completed his Recruit Training at Kapooka, he was allocated to the Royal Australian Engineer Corps. At the completion of his Initial Employment Training, Sergeant Russell was posted to the 2nd/3rd Field Engineer Regiment.

Sergeant Russell successfully completed the Special Air Service Selection Course in 1991 and completed a number of specialist courses ranging from patrolling, demolitions, parachuting, sniper, and medical.

During Sergeant Russell's service in the Australian Army he deployed on the following Operations:

OPERATION BLAZER (Iraq) - 1997

OPERATION WARDEN (East Timor) - 1999

OPERATION SLIPPER (Afghanistan) - 2002

OPERATION POLLARD (Kuwait) - 1998

OPERATION TANGER (East Timor) - 2000

Sergeant Andrew Russell is survived by his wife Kylie and daughter Leisa.

What does ARVL hope to achieve?

Since January 2016, ARVL has provided in excess of 27,500 nights of accommodation to over 235 homeless veterans or those at risk of homelessness and over 480 years of accommodation for over 130 veterans through our affordable housing units.*

Emergency Accommodation

ARVL's emergency accommodation consists of 10 units, in the suburb of Sturt, designed to provide temporary accommodation for veterans who are homeless, at risk of homelessness or in need of transit accommodation. Our program operates with an adapted housing first solution and our primary goal is to focus on housing pathways to assist veterans in securing permanent housing. Additionally, whilst residing in our emergency accommodation, we develop individualised case plans to assist veterans to actively work towards addressing their own situation of homelessness by engaging with external support agencies and relevant Ex-Service Organisations.

RSL Care SA will provide a fully furnished one bedroom unit or bedsit (as pictured below). The length of stay at ARVL will be determined on a case by case basis and will be in alignment with personal circumstances and housing needs.

ARVL's Affordable Housing

ARVL's affordable housing portfolio consists of 36 affordable units (predominately one bedroom) and three houses designed to provide long term housing solutions for ex-service personnel and their dependents. These unfurnished units are targeted to applicants with the ability to live independently, meet all tenancy obligations and are on low to moderate income.

ARVL Impact Data - 12 months



An average of 5 enquiries a month for accommodation.

53% were single
31% were divorced/separated
15% married/de facto 1% widowed



87% of veteran residents have been diagnosed with a mental health condition



At the time of applying:

51% were actively homeless
43% were at risk of homelessness
6% had unsuitable housing



Gender of residents

88% male
12% female



Average age is 47 years old
Average length of service is 9 years

Australian Veteran Statistics

**Within a 12-month period:

5.3% of the recently transitioned ADF population were homeless in a 12-month period, which is significantly higher than for the general population at 1.9%.

Across a cohort of contemporary veterans,

50% of homeless veterans could be considered transitionally homeless; and of those:

25% are considered chronically homeless.

How you can help

Cornerstone Program

\$2,500 provides sponsorship and naming rights to an ARVL unit for a year. This includes:
